In this course, the class will trace the history of the United States from colonial times to the end of the Civil War. Through lectures and class discussions, the class surveys American developments from distinct colonial societies to revolutionary and national consciousness along the Atlantic coast, internal expansion and commercial growth to the rise of racial and constitutional conflict and the Civil War catastrophe. Students will write one term tests, one research and one brief analytical essay and a final examination during the course.

Ideally, students should read the assigned chapters of The Enduring Vision or Social Fabric before each lecture. Your Theme Study will be a critical analysis of how Brogan and Nash portray a common theme in Colonial American history. The test will be short answer in nature, while the examination at the end of the course will include both short and longer essay type questions. ALL research essay topics must be cleared with me before final submission. An attendance and participation mark will be given, which measures both consistent appearance and taking part in the discussions. Late assignments will be penalized 10% each day they are overdue, UNLESS special permission is secured from the instructor in advance.
