This course analyses the problems, the institutions and the changing roles in Canada since Confederation and provides a base and some tools for inquiry into Canadian affairs. It is a core course for certain B.Ed. students.

**Course description winter 2002:**

This is an introductory survey course which examines the development of Canada from Confederation to the present. Major themes include: national expansion, regionalism, French Canada and Quebec, the peoples of Canada, the economy, political change, the shaping of Canadian society and culture, and Canada's relationships with Britain and the United States.
