Course Description

This course is a general survey of the history of Islam from about 500 to 1917. This course will provide a general overview of the rise and fall of the Islamic empire and its impact on the 20th and 21st centuries. This course will cover, in 13 weeks, the major events that shaped and sustained the Islamic Empire over 1400 years. Topics will include: Arabia before Islam, Mohammad's message, succession (Caliphate), wars of expansion, Umayyad and Abbasid periods, the decline and the resurgence of the Islamic empire during the Ottoman Empire, WWI, final dissolution of the Islamic empire, and western domination of the region.
