### **CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:**

A historical survey of Russia in the Soviet period from the revolutions of 1917 to the fall of Gorbachev.

All assignments are to be submitted before midnight on the due date. To encourage promptness and in fairness to those who complete their work on time, late assignments will be reduced 15% for each twenty-four hour period (or part thereof, including weekends and holidays) after the due date.

Students will be granted five (5) days of extension to use at their discretion during the term. They may be applied to any of the three assignments in any combination (ie. submitting one assignment three days late, another two days late and the third one time). Extensions beyond this will only be considered when students contact the instructor prior to the deadline and present evidence of

extenuating circumstances. Other scheduled coursework will not be considered an extenuating circumstance.
