History 3680: The Native Aspect of Canada's History before 1830

Introduction:

This course explores the experience of native peoples in Canada's history from first European contact to the generation of the 1830's. Through lectures, case studies and discussion of selected readings, the class examines and evaluates the interaction between European and native peoples during the colonial period in the light of the policies, interests and objectives of both native and newcomer groups. The course places special emphasis on Indian involvement in the fur trade, the development of European imperial and "civilizing" polices and the first attempts of native peoples to direct their destiny in the face of European incursion. Besides a mid-term test and the final examination, students will write one brief critical essay and one longer research paper on a topic of their choice.
