After this portion of class time, there will be a variety of interactive activities, including writing assignments, role play, and discussions.

Always talk to me if you need to be absent, or if your circumstances cause you to fall behind in class. It is the responsibility of the student to keep up with all assigned work, either reading or writing. Being prepared for class is expected, even after an absence.
