PREREQUISITE(S)/COREQUISITE: Any College or University course that deals with the history of a related topic. For a Fine Arts course, that would be an art, dance, drama, or music history course. Other courses may be acceptable prerequisites; check with the instructor.

REQUIRED TEXT/RESOURCE MATERIALS: ID2012A4 coursepack covering music history, suggestions for your assignments, text and explanations of pieces we will encounter, etc. You will need a logbook and two notebooks.

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: Interdisciplinary Topics in Culture is an exploration of masterworks and common practices, in the cultural history of European and North American culture. An aspect of this exploration will be examining the ways in which these arts have influenced society at large, and how they have fit into the locations of study. Content changes each year based on location, depending on where the Fine Arts Department travels in the spring session. Topics will typically include aspects of the visual arts and music but additional topics, such as a cultural history of a geographic area, may be presented in some sessions.

COURSE SCHEDULE/TENTATIVE TIMELINE: The course is 14 days in length, which includes two major travel days from Grande to our destination, and the return. If the course is held in more than one location, there may be an additional travel day during the course. On each of the active days at our destination, students can expect to spend somewhere between a couple and 10 hours with one or more instructors, as we meet the 45 hours minimum requirement for the course. This time will be spent in lectures and informal talks, galleries, museums, or other sites, and concerts, recitals, services, or other events. As long days will tend to help us get through the course hours quickly, you may also expect to have a couple days off for sightseeing, resting, doing laundry, etc.

Additional Costs: Travel is a significant cost. In addition to tuition, you will pay a set fee that will include point-to-point travel from and returning to Grande Prairie, accommodations, some meals, and some musical performances.
