The fundamentals of music theory are approached through aural and written training. No previous knowledge of music is required.

OBJECTIVES:

As a result of instruction, personal study, and reflection it is expected that all students who complete the course will be able to:

- Notate and read music sounds.
- Define basic musical symbols, terms, key signatures, and time signatures.
- Design and identify major and minor scales as well as intervals and triads.
- Identify (written and aural) and compose musical compositions in simple and compound meters.
- Create a variety of melodic and rhythmic compositions using the basic structural components of music theory.
- Compare, create, and analyze melodic and harmonic material as found in musical compositions.
- Evaluate, identify, and compose with the basic elements of melodic design.
- Use the tonic sol-fa system to perform various melodies.
- Perform basic scales, melodies, intervals, and triads or chords on the piano.
- Transpose a melody in a major or minor key.

Please note: Course material or assignments not covered in the textbook for this course or in this course outline may be added to this course.
