RUDIMENTS OF MUSIC MU1000 A3 3(3-0-0), Winter 2001 University Transfer to U of A, U of C, AU, AUC, ConUC, and KUC.

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Course Description: Rudiments of Music is an introduction to the language of music. This course will provide you with introductory knowledge and skills in a number of areas, including both written music theory and performed aural skills, as we explore rhythm, melody, harmony, and other aspects of musical expression. Applied musical experience will be an important component of the course. By the time you have finished the course, you will be able to: identify and understand elements within written music; notate and read music; identify and write down some of what you hear in music you listen to; define basic musical symbols and terms; understand how composers achieve some of the emotional effects of their music; write and identify major and minor scales, intervals, and triads; recognise time signatures, and have a far greater understanding of the music you experience on a daily basis.

Prerequisite: There is no pre-requisite (course or skills) for this course.

Evaluation: The student's grade will be determined by the following weighting:

 B) Assignments

 C) Quizzes

 D) Final Exam (cumulative)

 E) Attendance

Assignments: Assignments will be frequent, and will take several forms. To develop the skills that are part of this course, you <u>must</u> complete the assignments. Music is very much a practical skill, not just "book learning," and as such, you must practice regularly to develop your ability. Assignments are due at the beginning of class, and will not be accepted late.

Progression Policy: All students who are absent from more then 20% of one of their classes may be told to leave that class. Further, if students fail to complete and submit 85% of the graded requirements of the term mark, they will not be allowed to write the final exam, or complete the course. In such a case, the student will automatically receive a failing grade of DB (debarred). See P. 29 of the 2000/2001 Calendar for more details. Students should receive timely notice if they fall below the 85% submission requirement. They have the right to appeal to the registrar should they be told to leave the class.
