# **COURSE OUTLINE – FALL 2019**

# MU1010 (A2): Introduction to Music – 3 (3-0-0) 45 Hours for 15 Weeks

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**CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:** An introduction to active music listening and music literature. Focus is on developing listening skills and awareness of musical style. A brief survey of Western art (classical) music is included.

## PREREQUISITE(S)/COREQUISITE: None

#### **REQUIRED TEXT/RESOURCE MATERIALS:**

- *Listen,* 9<sup>th</sup> ed., by Joseph Kerman and Gary Tomlinson, 2019, Norton.
- A collection of downloadable files is included with the text, along with access to streaming audio and video files via the text's website.
- Concept maps and other resources are available on Moodle.
- You may be required to analyze some popular music. You MAY be able to access songs for free online (e.g. via YouTube) but it will be better to buy the tracks online (e.g. at iTunes) or get them via a streaming service such as Spotify or Deezer because the audio quality will be higher.

#### **DELIVERY MODE(S):** Lecture

**COURSE OBJECTIVES:** This course is designed to help develop a greater understanding of music, and to help you become a more active listener. We will explore specific features of music, and listen to a variety of masterpieces and lesser-known works. Aspects of performance will be discussed, particularly in relation to videos you will see in class. The beginning section of the course will focus on music fundamentals and terminology so that we can discuss what we are hearing throughout the rest

of the semester. We will look at music in its cultural context, examining it in relation to other arts and non-musical historical events that helped shape the music, and becoming familiar with how the sounds we hear have changed over the centuries. Listening to music will be a central element of the course, and will be part of the quizzes and exams.

**LEARNING OUTCOMES:** Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to demonstrate knowledge of music fundamentals, knowledge of the broad arc of the development of the Western Art Music Tradition, and active listening skills that include the ability to perceive structure and style in music.
