**CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:** An introduction to active music listening and music literature. Focus is on developing listening skills and awareness of musical style. A brief survey of Western Art (classical) music is included.

## **DELIVERY MODE(S):** Lecture

**OBJECTIVES:** This course is designed to help develop a greater understanding of music, and to help you develop active listening skills. By the end of the course, you will be able to identify elements within a piece of music, and identify several different genres and forms of Western art music. You will also be

familiar with the broad arc of the development of Western Art Music. To achieve this, the beginning section of the course will focus on music fundamentals; we will learn what we can hear and do hear, discuss some basics of music theory, and learn terminology so that we can discuss what we are hearing. Throughout the semester, we will look at music history in its cultural context, examining it in relation to other arts and non-musical historical events that helped shape the music. Listening to music will be a central element of the course, and will be part of the guizzes and exams.
