CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: Private study of voice or a non-principal instrument. This is a two-term course offered over fall/winter terms. It is identifiable in the Schedule of Courses (Timetable) with a Part A and a Part B. Students must register in both the Part A and the Part B of all types of sections offered (sections, labs, seminars, etc.) for this course.

PREREQUISITE/COREQUISITE: Royal Conservatory Level 8 Theory, Conservatory Canada Gr.4, or MU1000.

Clarke – Technical Studies for Trumpet* Mark Ponzo – Low Tones and Etudes for Trumpet * Solo work for juries must be purchased (not photocopies) *Note: Not all of these books are required. Other books and repertoire may be suggested based on student's fundamental needs and specific goals (ex: jazz methods, flexibility studies, etc.) The instructor can recommend sources for purchasing music.

DELIVERY MODE(S): Studio lessons, Masterclass/Ensemble, Moodle Assisted

COURSE OBJECTIVES: Students enrolled in MU1220 (Brass) will receive weekly half-hour lessons (or one-hour bi-weekly lessons) where personal attention is given to the individual student's fundamental skills, technical abilities, musicianship, and repertoire. Pedagogical topics will also be discussed along with performance practices. Student's progress will be guided and

assessed on an ongoing basis during these lessons. General assessment will be made by the GPRC Fine Arts Music Faculty at the end of semester/year jury performance.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

During this course at Grande Prairie Regional College, it is intended that each brass student will:

- 1.) Develop the fundamental skills and abilities necessary for musical expression
 - a. Recognize the use of respiration leading to good sound and intonation
 - b. Rhythmic Integrity
 - c. Lip Dexterity
- 2.) Develop a critical musical ear
 - a. Aural Skills
 - b. Be informed on repertoire, styles, genres, history, and performers
- 3.) Grow in their ability to technically control one's own instrument
- 4.) Increase mental preparedness necessary for musical artistry, performance, and auditions

COURSE SCHEDULE/TENTATIVE TIMELINE:

Will include weekly lessons at a mutually agreeable time, weekly masterclass or discussions (schedule to be discussed), April jury (date and time TBA)

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES: Students in MU1220 (Brass) are responsible for their attendance and preparedness for each weekly lesson – this includes being on-time, sufficiently warmed-up on their instrument, and professionally dressed. **Cancellation will require at least 12-hour notice via email, except for certain extenuating circumstances (sudden illness, winter travel issues, for example).** It is encouraged that each student record their lessons or have a lesson journal to keep a record of lesson materials, discussions, suggestions, thoughts, etc. – this will benefit the student's musical growth as it provides a written record of their progress throughout the semester and also encourages self-reflection outside of each weekly lesson. Other suggestions for a successful semester include:

- 1.) Take care of yourself. As an aspiring performer, caring for your health (body and mind) is vital to your ability to perform. Do not underestimate the importance of proper rest.
- 2.) Stay hydrated and keep lip balm on-hand (This is especially applicable to Grande Prairie)
- 3.) Plan to be early this will help you avoid stress as you enter your lesson and ensures that you have time to warm-up.
- 4.) Be eager to learn. Come to your lessons with questions. This is a highly-competitive field, so ask and absorb as much as you can!!
