CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: Private study of voice or your principal instrument. This is a two-term course offered over fall/winter Terms. It is identifiable in the Schedule of Courses (Timetable) with a Part A and a Part B. Students must register in both the Part A and the Part B of all types of sections offered (sections, labs, seminars, etc.) for this course.

PREREQUISITE(S)/COREQUISITE: Royal Conservatory Level 8, Conservatory Canada Gr. 4 or MU1000. Corequisites: MU1400, MU1410

REQUIRED TEXT/RESOURCE MATERIALS:

Instrument Method books (Trevor Wye method for flute; Klose and Langenus for clarinet; and Larry Teal for saxophone). Woodwind study also includes books of studies and solo literature. The list of pieces, studies, and technique can be found in the Royal Conservatory of Music syllabuses for flute, clarinet, and saxophone. The goal for most students is the grade 8 or grade 9 level for the first year. Students should be prepared to pay for the use of a studio accompanist for juries, recitals, repertoire classes, and private rehearsal sessions.

DELIVERY MODE(S): Studio Lesson

COURSE OBJECTIVES: The course will move the student to the next objective in terms of playing development. The Royal Conservatory of Music guidelines are used.

LEARNING OUTCOMES: This course involves playing instruction on one of the three woodwind instruments: flute, clarinet or saxophone. Included in the study are exercises to develop

technique and articulation, improve tone quality, and work on pieces of music including studies, ensemble music, and solo literature. The curriculum for this course is the equivalent to Royal Conservatory Grade 8 minimum or a higher level if that is appropriate for the student. This course is restricted to full-time students in Bachelor of Music, Bachelor of Music Combined Degrees, and Acoustic Diploma.

- Students are required to attend 10 Fine Arts Department events over the course of the year. Concerts held at the College, Visitor In The Arts presentations (any discipline) and student performances that you are not involved in will qualify.
- Attendance at the Visitor in the Arts Music presentations is mandatory. Some community events will be accepted; check with your Instructor in advance of the performance for approval. Attendance at 10 events will constitute 5% of your final mark in this course.
