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Calendar This course explores the aural perception of materials covered in MU1550 and MU1560 Description: through the practice of sight-singing, dictation, and keyboard harmony.

Course Content:

This course requires the acquisition of both knowledge and skills, therefore, a considerable amount of repetition, practice, and rote learning is necessary. Daily practice is expected of all students. Regular attendance in class is also required, and will be a factor in determining the final grade.

Prerequisite: MU1000 or satisfactory completion of music theory placement and aural skills

Students will frequently sing in class, both as a choir and as vocal soloists. The Tonic Sol-Fa, or moveable do system, will be used to sing all exercises in class and for all oral

examinations. Material assigned as homework in one class may be tested in the following class without prior notice being given. In this case, a mark will be assigned and will be a factor in determining your final grade

Rhythmic study will involve simple rhythmic units, pulse, and simple and compound meter, division, subdivisions, syncopation, and polyrhythm.

The keyboard component will begin in January. It is expected that students who enter this course have a basic familiarity with the keyboard and are able to read and play all notes in the treble and bass clef.

Please note: Material or assignments not covered in the textbook for this course or in this course outline may be added to this course.

Piano Lab Requirements:

Sing and Play:

- Students will be asked to perform Sing and Play exercises throughout the first and second
- Students will play a simple accompaniment part with one hand or both hands while using tonic sol-fa to perform the vocal line.

Scales:

- The first seven major keys up to and including three sharps and flats, plus all three forms (natural, harmonic, and melodic) of their relative minor keys.
- Two octaves ascending and descending.
- Correct fingering should be used.
- Hands separately for non-piano majors. Hands together for piano majors or those with considerable piano experience.

Cadences:

- Incomplete Authentic and Complete Authentic cadential progressions in all major and minor keys up to and including three sharps and flats.
- Close position only must be used for all chord tones played in the right hand.

Figured Bass Realization:

- Realization of a figured bass passage in both a major key and a minor key.
- Start each exercise with the notes of the first chord played in close position in the right hand.

Score Reading:

- Choral style open score.
- Orchestral style open score.

Accompany A Simple Melody:

- Choose an appropriate accompaniment style.
- Choose the correct chords.
- Sing the melody while you play the accompaniment part.
