Calendar Description:	This is an introduction to Musics of the World and to ethnomusicology, the study of music in a cultural context. Case studies of music from several cultures and continents will be examined. The development of listening skills is an integral part of this course.		
Course Content:	This course is an introduction to, and survey of, music and related culture from several continents around the world. This requires a basic knowledge of music theory and terminology, which will be covered briefly at the beginning of this course. The bulk of the course material will be a series of case studies from several continents. We will listen, often numerous times, to musical examples from these cultures as we try to become familiar with their unique features.		
Evaluation:	Student grades will be assigned by the following weighting: Midterm examination (probably October 19 or 26) 25% Quizzes 20% Term paper 25% Final examination 30% The term paper will be a formal paper based upon field research that you will perform by attending at least one cultural event of ethnomusicological significance. The paper will be a minimum of five pages in length (minimum 1250 words), and topics <u>must</u> be chosen in consultation with the instructor.		
Timeline:	Papers must be typewritten, and are due on November 30 , unless you negotiate an extension <i>well in advance</i> of that date. Extensions will only be given if the scheduling of a particularly attractive cultural event, central to your research, occurs close to or after November 27. You will receive at least 5 days' notice in advance of each unit quiz that we will write.
