REQUIRED TEXT/RESOURCE MATERIALS: *World Music: A Global Journey*, 3^{rd} *ed*, *2012*, by Miller and Shahriari, 2012, Routledge. An essential set of CDs accompanies the text. Available in the bookstore.

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: This is an introduction to music of the world and to ethnomusicology, the study of music in a cultural context. Case studies of music from several cultures and continents will be examined. The development of listening skills is an integral part of this course.

DELIVERY MODE(S): Lecture

OBJECTIVES: This course is an introduction to, and survey of, music and related culture from several continents around the world. A brief introduction to music theory and terminology will provide some tools to discuss musical traditions. Case studies of musical cultures and practices from several continents will provide us with material to discuss culture, tradition, ritual, ethnocentrism, and more.

LEARNING OUTCOMES: Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to demonstrate familiarity with and knowledge of several of our planet's musical traditions, and use cultural contexts of different musical practices to gain a better awareness of their own cultural practices. Students will

be able to overcome ethnocentrism through greater awareness of human traditions. Students will have developed listening skills to appreciate and analyze music, to identify instruments, forms, genres, and other aspects of musical practice, and be able to explain why much of the value of any music is not necessarily sonic.

EXAMINATIONS:

The term paper will be a formal paper based upon field research that you will perform by attending at least one cultural event of ethnomusicological significance. The paper will be a minimum of five pages in length (minimum 1250 words), and topics <u>must</u> be chosen in consultation with the instructor.
