COURSE DESCRIPTION

MU 2090 is designed to provide instrumental music education students with the fundamental skills and knowledge of saxophone and clarinet performance to enable the student to teach both woodwind instruments in a professional school situation. No previous experience required on woodwind instruments. However, the ability to read music (treble clef) and a basic understanding of rudimentary music theory is essential for the student to be successful in this course.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

As a result of instruction, personal study/practice and reflection it is expected that all students who complete the course will:

 have the ability to play the clarinet and saxophone at the level of a good junior high school woodwind player.

 be knowledgeable about different pedagogical approaches to clarinet and saxophone performance.

 be aware of proper maintenance of the clarinet and saxophone and have the ability to perform basic repairs.

be aware of basic reed preparation, maintenance and adjustment techniques.

 have a knowledge of essential method books and solo repertoire and their appropriateness with students at different levels of accomplishment.

6) be familiar with the main styles of clarinet and saxophone performance through sound recordings of the core repertoire of both of these woodwind instruments.

knowledge of resource material and literature of both the clarinet and saxophone.

Saxophone: At least three playable reeds at all times. It is suggested that you choose average strength reeds (2, 2 1/2, 3) from the following brands: Hemke, Vandoren - V16
