CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: The aural perception of materials covered in MU 2550 and MU 2560 through the practice of sight-singing, dictation and keyboard harmony is covered. This is a two-term course offered over fall/winter terms. It is identifiable in the Schedule of Courses (Timetable) with a Part A and a Part B. Students must register in both the Part A and the Part B of all types of sections offered (sections, labs, seminars, etc.) for this course.

PREREQUISITE(S)/COREQUISITE: MU1510 and MU1560 / MU2550 and MU2560

DELIVERY MODE(S): Lecture in conjunction with interactive participation in the music lab L228; Moodle assisted.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: To develop and heighten the aural cognition of melodic, harmonic and rhythmic dictation. Units of study include intervallic, chordal and cadential recognition, open score reading and scale reading. Students will further improve their understanding of solfege singing with more complexity of altered notes. In the process of singing, students will strive to produce good tone and intonation through appropriate vocal technique. Students are expected to perform all intervals and melodies in a musically expressive manner.

Although sight-reading is one component of Aural and Keyboard Skills II, it is equally important to demonstrate singing with good vocal intonation, tone quality and overall musicianship.

Rhythmic training will encompass a variety of rhythmic intoning systems Rhythms should be by tapping or intoning while conducting.

Keyboard skills will include playing of scales and cadences, reading open score, keyboard harmonization based on figured bass and general keyboard proficiency through singing while providing accompaniment.

Please note: Material or assignments not covered in the textbook for this course or in this course outline may be added to this course.

LEARNING OUTCOMES: Through repetition and focused practice, students will develop fundamental aural and sight reading skills in music including (but not limited to): By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Sight-singing using moveable do solfege, with accurate intonation and proper vocal technique
- Complex rhythmic training
- Identify of intervals, chords, and cadences
- Dictation of melody, harmony and rhythm
- Keyboard piano skills inclusive of playing all 24 keys for scales, cadences, open score and general keyboard proficiency
- Students will be examining melodies that contain a considerable amount of chromatically altered notes. When solfegging this chromatic literature, it is expected that students will be able to correctly tune all diatonic and non-diatonic melodic pitches. Students should be able to provide suggestions as to the possible harmonic or non-harmonic implications of the melodic notes and intervals found in the prepared melodies. Students will frequently use melodic analysis skills to determine tonal shifts, or modulations, found in their assigned melodies. Students will also experience group singing in duets, trios and rounds.
