**CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:** The aural perception of materials covered in MU2550 and MU2560 through the practice of sight-singing, dictation and keyboard harmony is covered. This is a two-term course offered over fall/winter terms. It is identifiable in the Schedule of Courses (Timetable) with a Part A and a Part B. Students must register in both the Part A and the Part B of all types of sections offered (sections, labs, seminars, etc.) for this course.

# **OBJECTIVES:**

The acquisition of fundamental aural and keyboard skills is a crucial component of a musician's career development. Students will be challenged to learn, practice, and perform a wide variety of musical materials. Although it is impossible to address every performative challenge encountered in even one musical idiom or genre, by developing

learning strategies and practice techniques related to the core materials studied in this course, students will be better able to approach the myriad performance challenges found across the spectrum of musical activities.

As time allows, short discussion sessions will also be led on topics related to other skills central to careers in music (e.g., financial management, self-promotion, developing connections, etc.), according to student need and interest.

### **LEARNING OUTCOMES:**

In this course, students will develop fundamental skills related to the performance of music, including (but not limited to):

- the dictation of musical elements including melody, harmony, and rhythm
- sight-singing using moveable do solfege, with accurate intonation
- reading and performance of complex rhythms
- aural recognition of musical materials including intervals, chords, and cadences
- the ability to effectively use appropriate conducting patterns while intoning rhythms
- melodic analysis skills related to chromatic inflections and modulations
- keyboard (piano) skills including the playing of scales and cadences, harmonic sequences and progressions, reading open score, and general keyboard proficiency through singing while providing accompaniment.
