MUSIC THEORY III

Time and Location: Monday, Wednesday, Friday 11:00 -11:50 L127. Instructor: Dr. Paul Rathke, L120, 539-2015

- Course Description: A study of "Common Practise" harmony including advanced harmony with discussion of the form, elements and architecture of Renaissance, Baroque and Classical music.
- 2. Prerequisite: MU1550 Music Theors I and MU1560 Music Theory II.
- 3. The Course in Perspective: The course begins with a thorough review of diatonic harmony including harmonizing a simple melody and realizing a figured bass of moderate difficulty. This review leads to a study of species counterpoint and continues with careful analytical study of various forms. Students will be expected to analyze and emulate styles of the various periods.
- Assignments: Students will have regular reading and written assignments from the text.
- 5. Grading: The students' grades will be determined by the following weighting:
- A) 20% for classroom participation and tests
- B) 30% for assignments
- C) 20% for mid-term examination
- D) 30% for semester final examination
- 6. Topics: Review (four-part writing, cadential formulas, modulations, secondary dominants, non-harmonictones and figured bass); Renaissance polyphony, implied harmony, melodic organization, form, text setting, voice-leading in two parts, chromatic harmony, borrowed chords, development of motives, the fugue, variation technique and style comparisons.
