CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: An exploration of practice, design, and structures of song writing, including lyrics, melodies, harmonic progressions, and forms. In assignments, students will use a variety of techniques to unify those aspects into successful compositions.

DELIVERY MODE(S): Lecture and Lab

COURSE OBJECTIVES: Develop an understanding of harmonic, melodic, lyrical, and formal tools to enable students to write songs that are structurally sound, musically interesting, and lyrically meaningful. Students will develop habits and skills to successfully write lyrics, create and resolve musical tension, explore creative processes, develop an understanding of business aspects of creating music (copyright, publishing, and more), and produce lead sheets and recordings to share with other musicians.

LEARNING OUTCOMES: Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to write lyrics using poetic devices, identify and use a number of tools including motivic development, chord progressions and song forms, create lead sheets and recordings, and be familiar with aspects of the business of songwriting.

COURSE SCHEDULE/TENTATIVE TIMELINE: This course will begin with an introduction to analyzing songs and continue on with an exploration of the creative process, poetic devices, and lyrics writing.

This will be followed by discussions of chord progressions and melodic design. By the end of February, we will have progressed from writing parts of songs to writing entire songs and making recordings. Aspects of the songwriting business will be discussed in the closing weeks of the semester.

Exercises will be part of many of our class sessions; this will include object writing, song analysis, song critiques and editing, and more.
