CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: This course provides the opportunity to study several aspects of popular music, and the society and culture that surround it. Topics may include politics and propaganda; issues of gender, sexuality and race; identity and counterculture; music lyrics, and video analysis. → In 2015, our topic is the history of rock musics; this is an in-depth exploration of aspects of rock-related musics that were not comprehensively covered in DD1021.

OBJECTIVES (OPTIONAL): Generally, you will become familiar with music styles, artists, and the cultural contexts and histories of several distinct rock-related musics. The majority of the content will focus on North America—especially the United States—but time will be spent exploring the contributions of other countries, such as Canada and Great Britain. We will also need to look at some aspects of the global music industry. By the end of the course, you will be familiar with many different genres of rock and roll, rock, post-rock, rap and hip hop, and blended musics. You will understand how they are the products of their environments and how the economic system surrounding popular music functions, and how the artists, music, and consumers all play a role in the identities of the cultures that have developed them.

You will demonstrate your knowledge and understanding of an aspect of the course through a research project involving a formal paper and a class presentation. Topics should be chosen before February **10** in consultation with the instructor, and the written paper will be due by the *beginning* of class on April **09**. The paper must be a <u>minimum</u> of 2500 words (roughly 10 typed pages, depending on your font) in length, and must be typed. You must submit the term paper to be allowed to write the final exam.

Because some of our time together will be organized as class discussions, <u>assigned readings must be</u> <u>done before the date for which they are due</u>.

There are no opportunities for make-up work, so plan to submit your work before it is due. Extensions may be granted for medical, religious, or compassionate grounds; they will only be granted *before* the due date.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES: Attendance is mandatory.

More than 20% absenteeism may constitute a failure except for medical or extenuating circumstances in which case a doctor's letter may be required.
