1. **Course Description:** Western Art Music from 1700 to 1870 (Music of the Late Baroque through the Romantic Period).
2. **Prerequisite:** MU1700 *Introduction to Music History* or consent of the department.
3. **The Course in Perspective:** The purpose of this course is to bring about an understanding of musical forms and styles from 1700 (Vivaldi, Bach, and Händel) to 1870 (Wagner). Students will be given a brief overview of Geo-political history and the intellectual history of this period. They will be exposed to the major composers of the period under study, and will become aware of important theoretical developments. Students will learn in what context, and as a result of what forces—social, cultural, and intellectual—the music of the late Baroque, Classical, and Romantic Periods came into being.
4. **Grading:** The student's grade will be determined by the following weighting:
 - A) 55% for regular exams.
 - B) 20% for term paper (see requirements below)
 - C) 25% for final exam
