NS 1205 Foundations for Success in Nursing

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

The course develops an understanding of self as a learner in a health professions context. It explores the foundations of professional nursing, relational practice and therapeutic communication. The course promotes reflection on personal perspectives and experiences to understand one's own attitudes, beliefs, and values. It fosters resilience and explores strategies for self-management and growth. Course includes 6 clinical hours total. Note: Available only to nursing students in the Collaborative Program.

DELIVERY MODE(S): Lecture, seminar, clinical

Lecture 2 hours a week Seminar 2 hours a week Clinical Hours – 6 hours total for the whole semester.

EVALUATIONS.

EVALUATION DESCRIPTIONS:

Concept Paragraph Part A and B 1)

The purpose of this assignment is to support student learning about the concepts of the course. This assignment also helps students learn to write scholarly, concisely, and use APA formatting.

Students working in their learning partners group will select one of the concepts from the list below:

Resiliency

- Stress
- Coping
- Fatigue
- Mindfulness

Students will then define the concept and discuss how the concept impacts either the:

- a. The development of a professional identity of a student in this program
- b. The health of an individual.

Students will hand in the assignment in 2 parts and will receive timely feedback for Part A in order to support them in creating Part B.

*Students should integrate feedback received from Part A into Part B.

For Part A Students will Submit the Following:

- 1. Title page, running head, page numbers APA format
- 2. Body page with:
 - a. Topic or thesis sentence/statement
 - b. A sample sentence that contains either an in text citation (paraphrasing) or an in text direct quotation. You will need to use correct APA citation formatting.
- 3. APA Reference page with 2 credible references. One reference will be a textbook and another will be a peer reviewed nursing literature source (article, professional organization etc.)
- 4. Students must use APA 6^{th} edition formatting and submit via Moodle drop box.

For Part B Students Will Submit the Following:

- 1. Title page, running head, page numbers APA format
- 2. Concept paragraph
 - a. Topic statement/thesis statement that introduces the purpose and what the paper intends to accomplish.
 - b. Body
 - c. Concluding sentence that summarizes and provides an interesting/thought provoking message.
- 3. Purposefully integrate feedback received from Part A into Part B.
- 4. Must integrate supporting references throughout paper.
- 5. Reference page- 2 references (one textbook, one other see part A)
- 6. Must include feedback (rubric and comments) received from Part A as an appendix in Part B.
- 7. Students must use APA 6th edition to format the paper. Please submit via Moodle Drop box
- 8. Word count (not including the title page and reference pages) maximum 200 words.

2) Professional Manifesto

A *manifesto* is a powerful declaration of values and intentions about a topic, idea or event. This manifesto will act as your opportunity to consider, reflect and create your personal declaration of who you are today and who you aspire to become in this nursing program. Once written, the manifesto should serve as your personal document upon which you will hold yourself accountable.

This assignment is your personal declaration of what you value about nursing as a profession, what you believe about being a student in a professional program and the vision you have for yourself as a student in this professional program.

The Professional Manifesto Will Include:

- 1. Introduction- include your topic sentence/thesis statement
- 2. Nursing as a Profession
 - a. What do you value/believe about nursing as a profession?
- 3. Being a student in a professional program
 - a. What values/beliefs do you live by?
 - b. What do you bring to the program?
 - c. What do you bring to the profession?
- 4. Your vision
 - a. What is your vision for yourself as a student in this professional program?
 - b. What values/beliefs do you intend to continue to uphold? Why?
 - c. What additional values/beliefs do you intend to integrate? Why?
 - d. How will your vision guide you throughout the program?
 - i. Through positive events?
 - ii. Through challenging times?
- 5. Conclusion

Please use APA 6th edition formatting. Include a title page and reference page. Maximum 1200 words. Please submit via Moodle Dropbox.

3) Quizzes

Students will complete weekly quizzes that will assist in understanding the concepts being presented in theory classes. Students will be given preparatory work for each week and the quizzes will reflect the content from that preparatory work.

All quizzes will be added up and an average will be given to make up the total 10%. There is no opportunity to rewrite or reschedule quizzes. A missed quiz will count as a zero on that quiz.

Quizzes are located on the Moodle site under each week for students to access at the beginning of each class. It is important that students are punctual as the quizzes will start promptly at the start of class.

4) Exams # 1 and 2

Content that will be covered in the exams includes all preparatory work on Moodle, theory class, seminar class and the clinical component. Exams are cumulative, meaning that concepts tested in the first exam will be tested in the second exam to ensure students have a good grasp of the information.

5) Seminar Participation

Participation and attendance in all seminars is mandatory and the information in these classes will be tested in the exams. Students are expected to come prepared with an open attitude of inquiry

and participate in the activities during class and online/journaling. Because of the nature of the seminars, it is imperative that student attend to build themselves up for success in the rest of the program. Attendance will be taken as well as ensuring that preparatory work and journaling is completed in a timely manner.

An attendance form will be passed around at the beginning of each class. Students will also submit at the end of the semester how they have shown active participation with a score out of 10.
