NS1250 4 (2-0-2) 75 Hours 15 Weeks

Nursing Practice – Health Assessment & Nursing Process

The focus is on the health assessment of the adult and expected health assessment findings throughout the lifespan. The course provides a beginning foundation of the nursing process as framework for developing assessment skills and use of clinical technologies necessary for determining client health status and provision of care. Course includes 15 clinical hours total. Prerequisites: NS1500 and NS1205 Corequisites: MI1330 and NS1240 Notes: Available only to Nursing students.

COURSE HOURS

Lecture: 2 hours/week Lab: 2 hours/week

Clinical: 15 hours over 13 weeks

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Upon completion of this course, the student must be able to:

- 1. Understand the role of health assessment in nursing practice and patient care in all settings.
- 2. Develop and demonstrate the relationship of health assessment and assessment skills in the nursing process through understanding of subjective and objective data collection, validation of findings, and exploration of beginning phases for patient care.
- 3. Provide rationale underlying for assessment techniques for subjective and objective data collection.
- 4. Apply therapeutic communication skills to facilitate professional relationship building, conducting health history interviews, health promotion activities, risk reduction identification, and patient learning.
- 5. Describe and demonstrate a holistic approach to health assessment across the lifespan.
- 6. Acquire the skills of physical examination and demonstrate safe, competent patient assessments.
- 7. Demonstrate professionalism and ethical practice during health assessment and nursing practice.
- 8. Demonstrate accurate, organized, concise documentation of health assessment findings.

CLINICAL PRACTICE PREPARATION

Professional responsibility for nursing students includes clinical practice preparation to evidenceinformed practice and patient safety. Preparation includes appropriate understanding, synthesis, and integration of relevant knowledge. The clinical instructor, in conjunction with the clinical site, will identify appropriate timeframes for students to access patient records.

Clinical practice preparation is required in addition to direct course hours. Student who are not adequately prepared to provide safe and competent patient care will not participate in clinical activities.

COURSE EVALUATION

A letter grade reduction per calendar day will be applied to all late assignments unless prior consent has been given by the instructor. Submit extension requests directly to the instructor. Requests will be considered PRIOR to the due date.

ASSIGNMENT DESCRIPTIONS

1) Lecture/Lab Pre-Quizzes: (10%)

The lecture pre-quizzes are completed on Moodle. These pre-quizzes will be multiple choice and will be completed by students individually on Moodle unless otherwise indicated. The content, timing, and frequency of the lecture quizzes are identified on the Moodle site for each week. Missed pre-quizzes will be assigned a score of zero. There will be no deferred or make-up quizzes. The average of all pre-quizzes will be worth 10% of the final grade.

2) Midterm Examination (30%)

The midterm exam will be administered over a 1-hour period. The exam will include content from lectures, required readings, and labs from Week 1 - Week 6 inclusive.

3) Submission toward Portfolio (10%)

Student will participate in a Jigsaw Puzzle activity to collaboratively learn about health assessment and the older adult. Following the activity, student will write a critical reflection





on their participation in the Jigsaw Puzzle for submission to their Portfolio along with any resources that their group developed for the activity. Student will submit a copy of their critical reflection in Moodle for grading.

4) Final Examination (35%)

The final examination will be administered over a 3.0-hour period during exam week as per the Registrar's Schedule of exams. The content is cumulative, and covers all lectures, required readings, and laboratory experiences.

Deferred final examinations may be granted when an examination has been missed or interrupted because of illness, or a conflict with religious beliefs. In the case of illness (physical, mental or emotional), medical documentation will normally be required. See page 42 of the 2019/2020 GPRC calendar for further information.

5) Clinical Practice (Clinical Assessment Tool) x 3 (15%)

A summative assessment of nursing practice will be completed by the student and the Clinical Instructor. This will be accomplished through observation, assessment and evaluation of the student during various clinical activities. Students will receive ongoing verbal and/or written feedback from the Clinical Instructor throughout the course in order to support learning. Feedback may be supplemental with input from peers, the staff of an agency, and the client.

Students at risk in any of the indicators on the Clinical Assessment Tool will develop a Learning Support Plan in collaboration with their Clinical Instructor. Students must successfully meet the Learning Support Plan by the agreed upon date. At final, students much achieve a "Pass" on all areas of the Clinical Assessment Tool in order to successfully complete NS1250.

6) SafeMedicate – Complete/Incomplete (April 13th – assessment open for 24 hours) Students will complete a health numeracy assessment on-line through the SafeMedicate program. The assessment focuses on basic math skills to ensure success in the dosage calculation required in nursing. There is no grade associated with the assessment, but completion is required to proceed to 2nd year. The assessment will be open for 24 hours starting at 0800 on April 13th until 0800 on April 14th. Once you have begun the assessment you have one hour to complete the questions. This program is used in all clinical practicums for the remainder of the nursing program. Information to purchase this program will be given in March 2020.

LATE ASSIGNMENTS

It is expected that <u>ALL</u> assignments must be completed to obtain credit in the course. Assignments are expected to be passed in at the time and place they are due. Extensions <u>may</u> be granted and <u>must be negotiated</u> with the instructor prior to the due date and with a date specified for late submissions.



A penalty of one letter grade for each calendar day that an assignment is submitted after the due date will be deducted from the final mark. For example, a paper marked as an A, would receive an adjusted grade of A- if handed in one day late. When submitting assignments **electronically**, it is the **student's** responsibility to ensure the assignment has been received.
