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Calendar Description

Major environmental issues, such as pollution, overpopulation, resource exhaustion, the rights of future generations and animal rights will be considered in regard to their ethical, aesthetic, or metaphysical ramifications.

Content Description

The course follows philosophical issues related to the environment in four general categories; ethical, political and two specific approaches to environmental philosophical issues - deep ecology and ecofeminism. The focus of the course is upon identifying key philosophical problems in this field and developing an understanding of the relationship between how these issues are framed and how they may be practically addressed. The term paper is a key element of the course. A wide scope of topics is provided and students are encouraged to develop and pursue environmental philosophical issues of personal interest.
