COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES:

Psychology 1040 provides a general introduction into the field of psychology. More specifically it provides an introduction into the following five areas:

- The nature and methods of present day psychology.
- The biological bases of behaviour.
- Learning, thinking and communication.
- Emotion and motivation.
- Developmental psychology.

The main object of this course is to provide the student with an introduction to the basic theoretical concepts, terminology, and important research findings in each of these five areas. By the end of his course the student should have developed a clear understanding of basic psychological concepts and processes.
