CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

This second introductory course in psychology follows PY1040 and gives students an understanding of themselves and other people through the study of basic concepts, principles, theories and methods used in the scientific study of behavior. The course covers biological and cognitive development, emotion and motivation, social psychology, personality theories, mental and behavioural disorders, treatment of mental and behavioural disorders, and stress and health.

CREDIT/CONTACT HOURS:

PY1050 consists of three hours of instructional time each week.

DELIVERY MODE(S):

This course includes lectures, class discussions and take-home exercises. This section will be videoconferenced.

OBJECTIVES:

As a result of taking this course, students will gain the abilities to define, explain, demonstrate, evaluate and articulate:

- The definitions, descriptions, and methods of measurement of intelligence, personality, knowledge, and creativity.
- The theories of emotion and the relative contributions of nature and nurture
- The theories of motivation
- The theories and fields of Social Psychology: person perception, social perception, attribution theory, conformity, obedience, attitude formation and change, leadership, love and friendship.
- The established historical and current theories of Personality: Psychodynamics, Humanism/Existentialism/Phenonmenology, Behaviourism, Cognitivism, and Trait theory.
- The theories of Human Development including biological, physical, intellectual, social, and moral development across the lifespan.
- The definitions, descriptions, and causes of abnormal psychology and disorders.
- The current and established treatments of abnormal and disorder psychology: Psychoanalysis, Behavioural Modification, Humanistic, Cognitive, and Drug Therapy
- The current understanding of health and stress in abnormal psychology and the application to the students' own lives and self-healing..

TRANSFERABILITY:

Students receiving grades of D or D+ will receive GPRC credit. These grades may not be acceptable for transfer to other post-secondary institutions, however. Students are cautioned that it is their responsibility to contact their receiving institution to ensure transferability. This course transfers to University of Alberta (PSYCO 105 (3)), University of Calgary (PSYC 201 (3)), University of Lethbridge (PSYC 2XXX (3)), Athabasca University (PSYC 290 (3)), Kings University College (PSYC 251 (3)) Grant MacEwan University (PSYC 105(3)), Canadian University College (PSYC 1XX(3)) and Concordia University (PSY 105 (3)). Students should check with their receiving institution concerning transferability as all arrangements are subject to change.

EVALUATION (cont.)

- Quizzes. There will be four quizzes; each will be in a <u>multiple choice</u> format. Each quiz is worth 5%, for a total of 20%. Please refer to page 6 of this course outline for more information on missed quizzes.
- Midterm and Final Exam. The midterm and final exams will include multiple-choice and short answer questions. The multiple choice questions are taken "primarily" from the test-bank and the short answer questions will be taken primarily from the lecture material. The final exam will NOT be cumulative; it will cover material from after the midterm to the end of term. The midterm is worth 30%; the final exam is worth 35%.

- 3. <u>Attendance.</u> Student input during lectures is enthusiastically welcomed and strongly encouraged. There are a variety of ways that you can contribute to the lectures, such as asking relevant questions, making insightful comments during the lectures, contributing to discussion during group work. <u>Attendance is taken during each class</u>.
- 4. <u>Chapter Assignments.</u> There will be 8 multiple choice chapter assignments, each comprised of questions taken from textbook's test bank. Your marks across all the assignments will be averaged. The average mark of all the assignments is worth 10% of your overall grade.

Student Conduct



It is expected that all students will display a respectful attitude and respectful behaviour in the classroom. Cellphone usage/texting during class time is PROHIBITED. Lecture Attendance/Absences

Students are held accountable for all lecture materials and readings. It is your responsibility to keep up with class work. Therefore, you are expected to attend all lectures. Attendance will be taken every class.

If you are absent from a class, all missed material is to be obtained by approaching a fellow student, <u>not</u> the instructor. It would be <u>very unfair</u> for students who miss lectures to be advantaged by getting the instructor's notes. Typically, the quality of note-taking by students is quite variable. Therefore, if you miss a lecture and need to rely on another student as a source for the missed lecture material, it is advised that you pick your sources very carefully.

If you are missing a class for excusable reasons (e.g., illness, appointment) and wish to avoid having your attendance/participation grade from being docked, please email me at ckorpan@gprc.ab.ca. Write "Absence from PY1050 Class" in the subject box. Provide the explanation for your absence in your email. Please be aware that I may ask for documentation.

Other Responsibilities

You are also expected to prepare for each lecture by reading the assigned chapters and handouts. Students who prepare for lectures learn and perform much better than students who do not prepare.

Although the instructor feels that all the material in the text book is important and interesting, limited class time prevents discussion of all the material covered in the text.

You are responsible for learning textbook material that is not discussed in class. Please feel free to approach me outside of class if you wish to get clarification on this material.

Missed Quizzes/Exams

Dates for the quizzes and midterm are included on this course outline. Quizzes that are missed for any reason will <u>not</u> be rescheduled. If a student misses a quiz due to verified illness, dentistry, accident, emergency, or GPRC obligations (e.g., you are away due to the requirements of another course) the weight of the quiz will be transferred to the final exam. If a student misses a quiz for reasons that do not include verified illness, dentistry, accident, or emergency, then a "0" (zero) will be assigned to that quiz. Holidays, employment, etc. are not considered to be excusable reasons to miss any exam in this course. Missing any quiz without explanation from the student will result in a "0" on that quiz.

According to GPRC policy, deferring a missed **Midterm Exam** is at the discretion of the instructor. In my courses, students who miss a midterm because of illness, dentistry, accident, or emergency (verified) may write the midterm at a later date (set by me—I will chose a date that is mutually convenient). When students miss the midterm for reasons that do not include verified illness, dentistry, accident, or emergency, a "0" is assigned to that the midterm. Students who miss the midterm without explanation will receive a "0" on the midterm.

Absences from a registrar-scheduled Final Exam fall under GPRC Examination Policy. It is the responsibility of the student to be informed about these policies prior to the final examination period. Just to remind you, final exams begin December 12 and end December 21. Activities such as holidays or employment during this period are not considered excusable reasons for missing the final. Students who chose to miss the final exam for employment, holiday, or similar reasons will receive a "0" on the final exam. Also note that the final exam will not be scheduled early for students who plan their holidays or other activities during the final exam period.

If the final exam is missed due to illness, you will be required to submit an application to the Registrar's office for permission to write a deferred exam and must do so within 48 hours of the scheduled exam time. You may defer the final exam for up to 20 days of the end of the examination period. You will be required to provide documentation for your illness. (Please see the College Calendar)
