Required Text/Resource Materials:

World History: Patterns of Civilization, Beers, (1989)

Credit/Contact Hours: This is a 5 credit course, meeting Monday and Friday 11:30 - 12:20, and Tuesday and Thursday 11:30 – 12:50. Classes run from January 4 to April 13.

Handout: Middle Ages in Western Europe, (500 - 1500)

Description: This course investigates the major movements of European history from 1500 to World War I, identifies the major ideas and forces which arose from these movements, and explores the role of these values in the modern world.

Delivery Mode(s): For each topic, there will be a classroom lecture and discussion. Relevant textbook readings will be assigned, along with reading assignment questions. Some topics will require research by internet in the

computer labs, or in the library. There are 9 units in the course and we will spend about 6 - 7 days on each unit.

Objectives:

Students will be expected to summarize information from a variety of sources, distinguish among different points of view, and make decisions and defend their choices.

Students will be expected to develop the ability to establish a thesis or take a position and defend it in essay format, present ideas effectively in class discussion, and express information and ideas, using timelines, charts or concept maps.

Students will be expected to develop skills using creative and critical thinking in problem-solving and decision-making strategies.

Attendance

The nature of Social Studies courses requires regular attendance and constructive participation. You are expected to be in attendance. Absence during an in-class assignment completed for marks will result in a mark of zero if you are absent. Assignments and tests are expected to be completed and handed in at the time specified. In order to have late assignments considered for grading, you must make prior arrangements with the instructor. If you have a legitimate excuse for not being in class during a test, please discuss the matter with the instructor. If you miss more than 15% of classes per semester in any course, you may be debarred from the final exam for that course.
