Course Description: This course examines the theory, methods and substance of sociology. How societies and individuals are shaped and modified by culture, socialization, deviance, stratification, group processes, industrialization and social movements will be covered.

Quizzes (Value 22%): There will be 11 weekly quizzes starting September 15; each will be in a multiple choice format. Quizzes are available online through Blackboard at the end of class and are available until the start of the next class. Each quiz is based on the weekly reading, class lecture and discussions and any other relevant material. Quizzes must be taken in the week that they are assigned and there will be no "make up" quizzes available. No exceptions will be made.

<u>Sociological Investigation Assignment</u> (Value: 15%): This assignment is designed to get students thinking about their topic for their term paper. Using sociological imagination and the steps for sociological research discussed in class two, students will design a research project. This assignment aims to help students think clearly about their research, finalize their research tool and design the steps they need to consider in order conduct research to complete their final research paper.

Due Date: September 29, 2008

<u>Survey</u> (Value 5%): Students will be able to first design their survey in the Sociological Investigation Assignment, receive feedback from the instructor and then re-design their survey for credit and for their term paper.

Due: October 20, 2008

<u>Bibliography</u> (Value 5%): Based on feedback from the Sociological Investigation Assignment, students will submit their literature review bibliography for review and credit.

Due: November 3, 2008

<u>Final Research Paper</u> (Value 45%): The research paper will be a continuation of the ideas and research method designed in the Sociological Investigation Assignment, Survey and Bibliography.

For the term paper, the following are mandatory requirements:

- correct spelling and grammar
- neat presentation
- application of theory
- double spaced
- organization and headings
- footnotes or endnotes
- bibliography
- table of contents
- copy of survey

Recommended format is

- 1.) Cover page
- 2.) Table of contents
- 3.) Body of paper with headings for each of the steps discussed in the Sociological Investigation Assignment and the class on Sociological Investigation
- 4.) Appendices (if required)
- 5.) Bibliography

Failure to complete a bibliography and appropriate footnotes or endnotes means a failure of the term paper. Late assignments will not be accepted after the end of term.

Due: December 15, 2008

A few notes...

<u>Due dates</u>: Due dates are assigned for a reason. Late work is usually marked with grade deductions and will be accepted in extenuating circumstances; but note, extensions are RARELY given! However, if needed, please see me to discuss why you cannot meet a deadline for the written assignment. Late work is subject to penalties regardless of the circumstances.

<u>Submission of papers</u>: Assignments and papers are to be submitted on time, typed, spell checked, stapled and neatly presented without any kind of plastic implements attached to the instructor at the start of class or by fax to the YREC office in Hinton. Students are also required to email a copy of their paper to the instructor to nancypat@telus.net.

Please do not use the drop box under Blackboard as I will not receive it!

I will email you to let you know that I have received your assignment. If you don't hear from me, then I haven't received your paper – it is YOUR responsibility to follow up! If you are late submitting your paper, I will not make a special trip into Hinton to the YREC office to receive it!

<u>Questions regarding assignments</u>: I am always available for questions by email or in person. Please be sure to consult with me prior to the due date.

<u>Sources / Documentation / Plagiarism</u>: Footnotes or endnotes are required for all written work. The MLA format is preferred; however, if you are more familiar with another method, please feel free to use it as long as it is consistent and correct.

Bibliographies are also required and must be done correctly. Please consult the reference book for assistance or ask me.

Taking something from the Internet? Be sure that your source is reliable and credible and not related to any hate group or illegal activity.

Written work is checked for plagiarism. Unsure what plagiarism is? Consult regulations set out by GPRC at the webpage below if you have any doubts. What happens if you are caught plagiarising? You fail the course – no debate.
