- Sociology studies the way society is organized. It also studies how human beings interact in the context of their social institutions. The course introduces this intellectual discipline as a way of analysing the complex, multicultural world in which we live. Over the course of the semester we will attempt:
 - To become aware of the influence society has on our everyday behaviour;
 - To build a picture of the overall structure of Canadian society;
 - To learn how to analyse frequently encountered social situations; and
 - To see daily events as the product of social systems as well as of individual actions.

INSTRUCTIONAL PROCEDURES

- All class sessions will be devoted to lectures and discussions.
 Lecture material is distinct from readings. Lectures are intended to complement and expand on assigned readings rather to duplicate this material. At times videos will be shown.
- Exams will cover the assigned readings and class lectures. The examinations will consist of a multiple choice and short written answer and/or essay questions that draw, equally, on material from lectures and readings. The balance of these will vary from test to test, with an increasing essay component for the final. The examinations will be non-cumulative. Make up exams or late assignments are not accepted or permitted.

- Being on time for class and class attendance is expected and required. For every four unexcused absences from class, your grade may drop by one number.
